

1.1 Subroutine Program

Point P

- This section describes the concept of subroutine.
- This section describes how to create a subroutine program with a programmable controller.
- This section describes that a programmable controller repeatedly executes operations (scans a program).

1.1.1 [CALL(P)] (Execution of a subroutine program) [RET] (End of a subroutine program)




• The above program shows the basic usage of the CALL and RET instructions used to execute a subroutine program.

Without such a program, an error occurs and a programmable controller will stop its operation.

- A subroutine program has ladders containing the processing that needs to be executed more than once. The program starts with a pointer P□ and ends with the RET instruction.
- Set the pointer (P) number within the following range. (This number is also used by the CJ and SCJ instructions.)




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

The following ladder program shows the above nesting structure.





- (1) When X102 is off
 - 1) Operations from 0 to the FEND instruction are processed.
 - 2) Turning on/off X103 turns on/off Y170.
 - 3) Turning on/off X104 does not change the on/off status of Y171.
- (2) When X102 is on
 - 1) After the P10 subroutine program is executed, operations from the step 3 to the FEND instruction are executed.
 - 2) Turning on/off X103 turns on/off Y170.
 - 3) Turning on/off X104 turns on/off Y171.

1.1.2 [FEND] (End of a main routine program)

FEND is a 2-step instruction.


• The FEND instruction is used as an instruction equivalent to the END instruction in the following cases.

1) When sequence programs need to be executed and terminated in each ladder block.

For example, the FEND instruction is used with the CJ and SCJ instructions.

2) When subroutine programs (the CALL and RET instructions) are used

- 3) When interrupt programs are used
- After execution of the FEND instruction, the programmable controller executes self-diagnostic check and then processes operations again from the step 0.



Precautions

- Although multiple FEND instructions can be used in sequence programs, the instruction cannot be used in subroutine programs and interrupt programs.
- The FEND instruction cannot be used at the end of a sequence program. Always use the END instruction at the end of a sequence program.

Point P

An interrupt program interrupts operations in a normal program and is processed when an interrupt factor occurs during execution of the normal program.



 - 1) Operations from 0 to the FEND instruction are processed.
 - 2) Turning on/off X104 turns on/off Y170.

1.2 Index Register (Z/LZ)

Point P

- This section describes the concept of index modification.
- This section describes how to use the index register with a programmable controller.

This device is used for the index modification of a device.

This device is used to indirectly specify a device number. The device number obtained by the addition of a device number in the index register and a directly-specified device number is specified.

Ex.

```
D0Z0 \rightarrow This means D (0 + Z0).
```

Device number

For example, when Z0 is 0, D0Z0 means D0. When Z0 is 50, D0Z0 means D50.

Types of index registers

There are two types of index registers: index register (Z) and long index register (LZ).

(1) Index register (Z)

This device is used for 16-bit index modification.

(2) Long index register (LZ)

This device is used for 32-bit index modification.



Index modification

Specify the device number using the index register. The device number to be used is "Device number of device targeted for modification" + "Contents of index register".

(1) 16-bit index modification

The device number is modified using the index register (Z). The modification range for the device in the case of the 16-bit index modification is -32768 to 32767.



(2) 32-bit index modification

The device number is modified using the long index register (LZ). The modification range for the device in the case of the 32-bit index modification is -2147483648 to 2147483647.

Index register setting



Point P

- This section describes differences between the file register and data register.
- This section describes how to create file registers.
- This section describes storage locations of device data.

The file register is a word device for extension. Data is stored in a file for the file register in the CPU built-in memory. This data is a file register file existing in the file storage area on the device/label memory.




Specification method

Two specification methods of file registers are provided: block switching method and serial number method.

(1) Block switching method


In this method, points of file registers in use are specified by being divided in increments of 32K points (R0 to R32767). When using multiple blocks, the points are specified by being switched to the block numbers used by the RSET instruction. R is used as the device symbol. The R range is R0 to R32767. In the following cases, however, the upper limit of device numbers will be "block size (unit: word) -1".

- The file register file size is smaller than 64K bytes.
- The file register file size is not a multiple of 64K bytes and the end block is specified by the RSET instruction.



(2) Serial number method

In this method, file registers having more than 32K points are specified with serial device numbers. File registers of multiple blocks can be used as consecutive file registers. ZR is used as the device symbol. The ZR range is "ZR0 to (file register file size (unit: word) -1)."





The battery holds data in the file register of the RAM.

The data cannot be cleared by resetting the CPU module or powering off the system. To clear the data, write "0".

1.4 Latch Function

Point P

- · This section describes the word "latch".
- · This section describes how to create a latch.

Data in each device/label of a CPU module is cleared to each default value in the following cases.

- When the CPU module is powered off and on
- · When the CPU module is reset
- · When the power failure time has exceeded the allowable momentary power failure time

Data in each device/label set in the latch setting is held even under the above conditions. For this reason, controls can be continuously performed with the held data even after the CPU module is powered off or when the power failure time has exceeded the allowable momentary power failure time while data is managed by sequence controls.

1.4.1 Latch types

The following two latch types are provided.

- Latch (1): Data within this range can be cleared by a latch clear operation.
- Latch (2): Data within this range cannot be cleared by a latch clear operation.

1.4.2 Devices that can be latched

The following devices can be latched. Local devices cannot be latched.

*1 When "Use Common File Register in All Programs" is enabled, all the points are registered within the range for Latch (2). The range can be specified in "Latch (2)" of "Latch Range Setting". (Values out of the specified range are cleared to 0.)

Point P

- When "Use File Register of Each Program" is enabled, the latch range for file registers cannot be specified. (File registers in the whole range are held.)
- When the file register file in use is switched with another one by the QDRSET instruction, the latch range setting for file registers is disabled. After the change, file registers within the whole range are held regardless of the latch range setting.

1.4.3 Optimal assignment of device points

The device points to be used can be optimally assigned according to a system.







2 FILE-BASED PROGRAM MANAGEMENT AND PROGRAM EXECUTION MANAGEMENT

2.1 File-based Management



This section describes advantages of multiple programs.

With the MELSEC iQ-R CPU module, multiple program designers can create a single program by dividing it into multiple files by function or process.

Advantages of file-based management

- (1) Programs can be stored into the memory in file units. Thus, addition or modification of a file in response to partial changes in a program does not affect other files.
- (2) Users can manage programs and data with names and time.
- (3) Write protection can be applied to each file.



The usage of the memory can be checked from the engineering tool. For details, refer to the following.

■Program memory/program cache memory

The program memory and program cache memory store necessary programs for the CPU module to perform operations. At the following timing, data in the program memory is transferred to the program cache memory^{*1} and an operation is performed.

- *1 This memory is used for program operations.
- When the CPU module is powered on
- · When the CPU module is reset
- (1) Application


The program memory and program cache memory store execution programs of program files and FB (function block) files. Execution programs include instruction codes, statements, and notes.

(2) Data to be allocated

Only the execution programs that exist in program files and FB files are allocated to the program memory.

(3) Data allocation and procedure of read/write operations

The following figure shows the data allocation of the program memory and program cache memory and the procedure of read/write operations from/to the programmable controller.



- (a) When data is written to the programmable controller, execution programs and steps reserved for online program change are written to the program cache memory, and the file header is written to the data memory.
- (b) After being written to the program cache memory, the data is automatically transferred to the program memory.
- (c) When the data is read from the programmable controller, the execution programs and steps reserved for online program change are read from the program memory, and the file header is read from the data memory.
- (d) When the CPU module is powered off and on or reset, the data in the program memory is transferred to the program cache memory and operations are executed.





Free space of areas can be checked by clicking [CPU Parameter] \rightarrow "Memory/Device Setting" \rightarrow "Device/Label Memory Area Capacity Setting" \rightarrow button.

■Data memory

This memory is used to store parameter files, device comment files, and/or user's folders/files. Data written by the engineering tool (e.g. parameter files and device comment files) is stored in the "\$MELPRJ\$" folder. The "\$MELPRJ\$" folder is created after memory initialization. Note that the "\$MELPRJ\$" folder cannot be deleted. (Folders under the "\$MELPRJ\$" folder can be deleted.)



Point P

For details on how to create and delete user's folders, refer to the following.

■Refresh memory

This memory is used to store data used in refresh communication with intelligent function modules.

■CPU buffer memory

This memory is used by the Ethernet function or in data communication between multiple CPU modules. (L MELSEC iQ-R Ethernet User's Manual (Application))

■SD memory card

This memory is used to store user's folders/files and the folders/files created by a function using the SD memory card. The folder configuration is the same as the one of the data memory. However, in the case of the SD memory card, the "\$MELPRJ\$" folder will be created when the SD memory card becomes available (when the SD memory card is mounted).

File size unit in memory

The minimum unit of capacity for storing a file in the memory is referred to as file size unit (cluster size).

Point P

Data is written in file size (cluster size) units. For example, when 464 bytes of CPU parameter is written to the data memory of the R04CPU, it is written as 1024 bytes of data because the file size unit of the data memory is 1024 bytes.

Memory operation

Using an engineering tool, each memory can be initialized and cleared to zero. For details on the operation method, refer to the following.

■Handling precautions

- The operation of the SD memory cards manufactured by Mitsubishi (NZ1MEM-□GBSD) has been tested on the MELSEC iQ-R series modules. If an SD memory card^{*1} manufactured by other companies is used, a problem, such as corruption of data in the SD memory card and system operation stop, may occur.
- SD memory cards manufactured by Mitsubishi conform to IEC 61131-2 when being used in a module.
- SDHC-type SD memory cards can be used only with CPU modules that support the use of those cards. (An SDHC logo is shown on the module or described in the manuals of the module.)
- All SD memory cards used by the CPU modules need to be formatted. An SD memory card is unformatted when purchased. Before using the card, insert it into the CPU module and format it using the engineering tool. Do not format an SD memory card using a personal computer. (L GX Works3 Operating Manual)
- Data in the SD memory card may corrupt if any of the following operations is performed while the SD memory card is being accessed: powering off the system, resetting the CPU module, or removing the SD memory card. If the CARD ACCESS LED is on, terminate the access to the SD memory card with the SD memory card access control switch, and then power off the system, reset the CPU module, or remove the SD memory card. The use of the SD memory card can be disabled by SM606 (SD memory card forced disable instruction) and the disabled status can be checked by SM607 (SD memory card forced disable status flag).
- Regularly backup important data on other media, such as CDs and DVDs.
- *1 For the SD memory cards that is commercially available and can be used with the CPU module, refer to the following. Before using a commercially available SD memory card, check that the card does not affect the control of the target system. www.MitsubishiElectric.co.jp/fa TECHNICAL BULLETIN No.FA-A-0078

■Precautions

If the system is powered off, the CPU module is reset, or the SD memory card is removed while the SD memory card is being accessed as below, data in the SD memory card may corrupt.

- Data in the buffer memory is being saved to the SD memory card. (Data logging function is being executed.)
- During deletion of a folder by "User Data Operation" in the engineering tool

In the above cases, SD memory card diagnostics such as file system check and restoration is performed at the timing to power on the system or to cancel the reset operation.

Note that data may not be completely restored depending on the file system status.

The following shows the time required to diagnose an SD memory card (when 10000 files (100K bytes of data) are stored in the SD memory card).*1*2

- NZ1MEM-2GBSD: approximately 7 seconds, NZ1MEM-4GBSD: approximately 8 seconds, NZ1MEM-8GBSD: approximately 9 seconds, NZ1MEM-16GBSD: approximately 10 seconds
- *1 The more the number of files in the SD memory card, the longer the diagnosis time.
- *2 When the CPU module is in connection with an external device, simultaneously running the CPU module and the external device can cause communication timeout on the external devise side.

2.2 Program Execution Management


Point P

This section describes program execution types.

2.2.1 Program execution types

Execution of programs can be managed in the conventional method, in which control contents are integrated into one program, or in the method in which a program is divided into multiple programs by control unit.


When dividing a program into multiple programs, set execution types in the program setting of the CPU parameter with GX Works3 to specify the execution type of each divided program.



The RCPU executes each divided program according to the execution types set in the CPU parameter program setting. The following five execution types are provided: initial execution type, scan execution type, standby type, fixed scan execution type, and event execution type.

Flow of program execution

Programs are executed in order according to the set execution types of the programs and execution order when the CPU module is switched to the RUN state.






Programs with the same execution type are executed according to the set execution order.


2.2.2 Initial execution type program

This type of program is executed only once when the CPU module is powered off and on, or switched from the STOP state to the RUN state. Set this type for a program that does not need to be executed after executed once in the initial scan, such as the initial processing for an intelligent function module.



Note that the execution time of an initial execution type program is the initial scan time.

When multiple initial execution type programs are executed, the execution time of the initial execution type programs will be the time to be taken until execution of all the initial execution type programs is completed.



*1 The sum of the initial execution type program execution time and END processing time is the initial scan time.

Precautions

The following lists the precautions for using initial execution type programs.


■Restrictions on program creation

In initial execution type programs, do not use an instruction which requires several scans to complete processing, such as an instruction with a completion device.

Ex. Example) SEND and RECV instructions

2.2.3 Scan execution type program

This type of program is executed only once per every scan starting from the scan after the scan in which an initial execution type program was executed.



When multiple scan execution type programs are executed, the execution time of the scan execution type programs will be the time to be taken until execution of all the scan execution type programs is completed.


Note that if an interrupt program, fixed execution type program, and/or event execution type program is/are executed before execution of the scan execution type program is completed, the execution time of these programs is also included.

2.2.4 Standby type program

This type of program is executed only when its execution is requested.

Librarization of programs

Use this type of programs when making a subroutine program or an interrupt program as a standby type program and managing it separately from a main routine program. In a single standby type program, multiple subroutine programs and interrupt programs can be created.




Execution method

Execute a standby type program as follows.

- Create a subroutine program and an interrupt program in the standby type program, and then call them with occurrence of an interrupt or by specifying them with pointers.
- · Switch to another execution type program.


The following figure shows the operation when the subroutine program and interrupt program in the standby type program are executed.



Program arrangement change


Use this type of programs when programs available for all systems have been prepared and only required ones are executed. For example, a program set as a standby type program in parameters can be changed to a scan execution type program with a program and executed.

Use the PSCAN instruction, PSTOP instruction, and POFF instruction for switching the execution type.



2.2.5 Fixed scan execution type program

This type of program is an interrupt program to be executed at a specified time interval. Unlike the normal interrupt programs, this type of program does not require interrupt pointers (I) and the IRET instruction, and is executed in program file units.



Point P


To execute a fixed scan execution type program, use the EI instruction to enable interrupts.

Operation when execution conditions are satisfied


A fixed scan execution type program performs the following operations.

- (1) When execution conditions are satisfied before interrupts are enabled by the EI instruction The program enters the waiting status and will be executed when an interrupt is enabled. Note that if execution conditions for this fixed scan execution type program are satisfied more than once while the program is in the waiting status, the program is executed only once when an interrupt is enabled.
- (2) When there are multiple fixed scan execution type programs When the specified time for these programs has passed simultaneously, they are executed in order according to the specified execution order.
- (3) When other or the same execution conditions are satisfied while a fixed scan execution type program is being executed The fixed scan execution type program is executed according to the fixed scan execution mode setting.
- (4) When execution conditions are satisfied while interrupts are disabled by the system The fixed scan execution type program is executed according to the fixed scan execution mode setting.
- (5) When an interrupt factor occurs during link refresh

Link refresh is suspended and the fixed scan execution type program is executed. Even while station-based block data assurance is enabled for cyclic data during refresh of such links as CC-Link IE, if the fixed scan execution type program uses a device specified as the refresh target, station-based block data assurance for cyclic data is not available.



(6) If an interrupt factor occurs during the waiting time after END processing in constant scan execution The fixed scan execution type program is executed.



- *1 If processing is not completed during the waiting time, the scan time is extended.
- (7) If another interrupt occurs while a fixed scan execution type program is being executed If an interrupt program (including an interrupt which triggers an event execution type program) is triggered while a fixed scan execution type program is being executed, programs are executed in accordance with the interrupt priority.

Fixed scan execution mode


For fixed scan interrupts (I28 to I31, I48, I49) triggered by a fixed scan execution type program or the internal timer of the CPU module, users can specify the program execution operation to be performed when multiple interrupt occur. However, an execution cause which occurs while interrupts are disabled by the DI instruction is excluded from the fixed scan execution mode target.

(1) Operation in the fixed scan execution mode

The following describes the operations that can be performed in the fixed scan execution mode.


Execution Count Takes Priority

A program is executed for the total number of pending executions and execution causes that has been generated after interrupts are enabled.




Precede Fixed Scan

When a pending execution exists, a program is performed within the delay limit value range. However, even if multiple pending executions exist, the program is performed only once.



(2) Delay limit value from the period

Set the allowable range of delay from the period. A pending program is executed when interrupts are enabled within this range. If interrupts are enabled outside the range, the program is not executed.




The delay limit value from the period differ as follows.

- · For fixed scan execution type programs
- The delay limit values from the period will be the greatest common divisor of the fixed scan intervals of all the fixed scan execution type programs. For example, if there are fixed scan execution type programs with 2ms, 4ms, and 12ms scan periods, the delay limit value from the period is 2ms.
- For fixed scan interrupts using the internal timer of the CPU module (I28 to I31, I48, and I49) The delay limit value from the period is equal to the fixed scan interval and fixed. For example, if the periods are I28: 100ms and I29: 20ms, the delay limit values from the period are I28: 100ms and I29: 20ms.

Executing the El instruction

The EI instruction clears the interrupt disabled state that has been set by the DI instruction, and enables execution of fixed scan execution type programs and interrupt programs with the interrupt pointer numbers permitted by the IMASK instruction. When the IMASK instruction is not executed, I32 to I47 are disabled.



Point ዖ

Terms

- (1) DI
 - This instruction disables execution of interrupt programs until the EI instruction is executed even though they are requested.
 - When the system is powered on or the CPU module is reset, the system is in the state where the DI instruction has been executed.
- (2) IMASK


This instruction enables or disables execution of the interrupt program with the interrupt pointer number specified by the 16-point bit pattern starting from the device specified by the start number of device areas (16-bit binary data) where interrupt factor mask data has been stored.

- 1 (on): Execution of interrupt programs is enabled.
- 0 (off): Execution of interrupt programs is disabled.

2.2.6 Event execution type program

Execution of this type of program is triggered by a specified event.

Programs are executed in the execution order specified in the program setting of the CPU parameters, and when execution conditions of a specified trigger are satisfied when the execution turn of the corresponding event execution type program comes, the program is executed.




*1 Measurement of elapsed time is 10ms or more because it is determined depending on the scan time.

Trigger type

The following lists the triggers for the event execution type programs.

(1) Interrupt occurrence by interrupt pointers (I)

When the specified interrupt factor occurs, the program is immediately executed once. However, before that, an interrupt must be enabled by executing the EI instruction. Enabling programs to be independently executed as interrupt programs, this method eliminates the need to write the FEND instruction, interrupt pointers, and the IRET instruction within scan execution type programs.




Point P

Execution conditions for the event execution type program which is triggered by an interrupt occurred by an interrupt pointer (I) are the same as those for general interrupt programs.

(2) Turning on (TRUE) of bit data

Programs are executed in the execution order specified in the program setting of the CPU parameters, and when specified bit data is on (TRUE) when the execution turn of the corresponding event execution type program comes, the program is executed. The current values of the output (Y), timer (T), and long timer (LT) used in this program can be cleared at the execution turn that comes after the specified bit data is changed from on (TRUE) to off (FALSE).



- (a) When Y50 is on at the execution turn of the event execution type program C, the program is executed. When Y50 is off, the program is not executed.
- (b) When "Clear Output and Current Value of Timer" is set, the current values of the output (Y), timer (T), and long timer (LT) used in this program are cleared at the execution turn of the event execution type program that comes after Y50 is off.

The following shows applicable devices.



(3) Passing time

After the status of the CPU module is changed into the RUN state, programs are executed in the execution order specified in "Program Setting" of "CPU Parameter". When the specified time has passed and the execution turn of the event execution type program comes, the program is executed once. The time is measured again from the start of the program execution, and the above operation is repeated. This method can be used when the processing is executed regularly after the specified time has passed. This method is not for executing an interrupt that interrupts another program execution to secure the punctuality. The current values of the output (Y), timer (T), and long timer (LT) used in this program can be cleared at the execution turn that comes after the specified time passes.



- (a) When the specified time has passed and the execution turn of the event execution type program C comes, the program is executed.
- (b) When "Clear Output and Current Value of Timer" is set, the current values of the output (Y), timer (T), and long timer (LT) used in this program are cleared at the execution turn of the event execution type program that comes after the specified time has passed.

Point P

Even though "Clear Output and Current Value of Timer" is set to "Clear" in the CPU parameters, the output value and the current value of the timer are not cleared when the scan time is longer than the value set to "Passing Time".

3 BASIC OPERATIONS OF GX Works3 (MULTIPLE PROGRAMS)

Program execution control instructions change the execution types of programs when the CPU module is in the RUN state. The following three types of program execution control instructions are provided.

- PSCAN instruction
- POFF instruction
- PSTOP instruction



*1 Once a fixed scan execution type program is changed to another execution type program, it cannot be restored to the fixed scan execution type.

The POFF instruction is used to securely turn off external outputs (Y) when a program is changed to a standby type program.

Program execution control instructions change the execution type of the program that has been read in the program memory.

These instructions do not change the execution type of the program that has not been read in the program memory from a memory card.

This area displays the execution type of each program set in "Program Setting".

(3) "Execution Time"

This area displays the actual execution time (current value) of each program. When a program has stopped (in the standby status), "0.000ms" is displayed as the execution time of the program. Display contents of programs vary depending on the execution type of each program.

* When the actual program processing time is short, the execution time display does not change.

(4) "Execution Count"

This area displays the number of executions counted starting from 0 at the point of when the CPU module is set to the RUN state.

The number of executions is held even after the program has stopped.

"Entire Execution Time"

This area displays the monitoring time set in "RAS Setting" of the CPU parameters and the total execution time of each program type.

(1) "Monitoring Time"

This area displays each monitoring time of scan programs and initial programs. When the execution time exceeds this time, a watchdog timer error is detected in the CPU module.

(2) "Total Execution Time"

This area displays the total scan time of the programs being executed by the CPU module. Scan programs include END processing time.

"Details of Execution Time for Scan Execution"

This area displays details of the execution time.

- (1) "Program Processing Time" This area displays the total execution time of scan programs.
- (2) "END Processing Time" This area displays the END processing time.
- (3) "Constant Waiting Time"

This area displays the waiting time of the constant scan when the constant scan has been set.

4 FUNCTIONS OF RCPU

4.1 Constant Scan Function




This section describes the function that keeps scan time constant.

Scan time changes in each scan because its processing time varies depending on whether instructions used in a program are executed or not.

With constant scan, the I/O refresh interval can be kept constant even when the program execution time varies because the program can be executed repeatedly with the constant scan time.

• When constant scan is set (Setting value = 7ms)



Point P

Set the constant scan time in "RAS setting" of "CPU Parameter".

The setting time for the constant scan must be a value that satisfies the relational expression below. "WDT setting time" > "Constant scan setting time" > "Maximum scan time of the program" If the maximum scan time of the program is longer than the constant scan setting time, it is assumed as an

error to ignore the constant scan, and the scan time of the program is applied.

Accuracy of constant scan

The accuracy of constant scan is 0.01ms. However, if the processing, which should be executed during waiting time from the completion of the END processing to the start of the subsequent scan, is executed, the constant scan cannot be completed even though the constant scan time has come. The constant scan may increase by the program execution time of an interrupt factor.

Precautions

Processing of a program stops during waiting time from the completion of the END processing to the start of the subsequent scan. When any of the following processing requests is issued during waiting time, the corresponding processing will be executed.

- Interrupt program
- Fixed scan execution type program
- · Event execution type program triggered by occurrence of an interrupt
- · Device/label access service processing

4.2 Device Initial Value


Point *P*

This section describes how to set initial values in devices.

To use device initial values, set the values in advance. When the system is powered on, the CPU module is reset, or the operating status of the CPU module is changed from STOP to RUN, data in a specified device initial value file is automatically transferred to specified devices or the buffer memory of an intelligent function module. Thus, no program for setting device data is required.

Ex.

Program memory, ROM, and memory card



■Required setting

To use the device initial value setting function, set "Device Memory" and "Device Initial Value" in the "Project" view. Write the device initial value file to which these settings have been reflected to the program memory, ROM, or a memory card of the RCPU.



Point P

In this exercise, the device initial values can also be written to the programmable controller at the same time with parameters and programs.

Reason: The device initial values, programs, and parameters use the same target memory.

(In this exercise, the program memory is used for all data.)

Generally, the target memory area for the device initial values differs from the one for programs and parameters. Each of them can be separately written to each target memory.

To prevent unauthorized browsing of programs (in units of program files) with a security key, use the security key authentication function.

4.4.1 Realtime monitor function

This function monitors the contents in specified devices of the CPU module in real time at a specified interval or desired timing. The function can be set with GX LogViewer, which graphically shows value changes of specified devices. Saving set data and displayed graphs makes it possible to simplify settings and check the graphs later.



4.4.2 Memory dump function

This function saves data in the devices of the CPU module at desired timing. Checking data at desired timing through the function facilitates analysis of troubles, which occur under particular conditions.



5.1 Intelligent Function Module

Types of intelligent function modules

Intelligent function modules can execute functions that CPU modules (hereinafter referred to as RCPU) cannot execute, or they realize functions that are limited to some applications.

Thus, select an intelligent function module appropriate to purposes.

RCPU-compatible intelligent function modules can be used with the RCPU.

The following table lists some intelligent function modules as an example.

5.2 Data Communication Between Intelligent Function Modules and the CPU Module

Intelligent function modules and the CPU module transfer data of the following two types in data communication. Bit data: Input (X) and output (Y) signals

Word data: 16-bit or 32-bit data




Figure 5.1 Internal configuration of the intelligent function module

5.2.1 I/O signals to the CPU module

The symbols X (input) and Y (output) are used for 1-bit signals transferred between the RCPU and intelligent function modules.

These X and Y signals are different from external inputs and outputs. These X and Y signals are dedicated for intelligent function modules and used in sequence programs. I/O numbers are assigned according to the slot where the intelligent function module has been mounted.




Figure 5.2 Input (X) signals from the R60AD4

X signals used in sequence programs are input to the RCPU from an intelligent function module. These signals are generated in the intelligent function module. X signals are used as contacts in a program. The following shows some X signals as examples.

(1) READY signal

This signal notifies the RCPU that the intelligent function module has normally been started at power-on and is ready.

(2) Operating condition setting completed This signal is used as an interlock condition for tu

This signal is used as an interlock condition for turning on or off Operating condition setting request (Y9) when any of the following settings is changed.

- A/D conversion enable/disable setting
- CH□ Time Average/Count Average setting
- · Averaging process setting




Figure 5.3 Output (Y) signals from the CPU module


The SET, RST, and OUT-Y instructions used in sequence programs are output to the intelligent function module from the RCPU. These signals are generated in the RCPU. Y signals are used as coils or contacts in a program.

Ex.

A D/A converter module outputs an instruction to allow external output of an analog value converted from a digital value.

5.2.2 Data communication with intelligent function modules

Data is transferred in units of 16 bits or 32 bits. An intelligent function module has buffer memory areas for storing the data.



Memory map example: R60DA4 digital-analog converter module

Figure 5.4 Buffer memory area

- (1) The RCPU reads/writes data from/to buffer memory areas. Some modules can write data to the buffer memory areas through an interface of peripheral.
- (2) In the buffer memory, addresses unique to each intelligent function module are assigned in units of one word (16 bits). The start address is 0, and these addresses are used to specify areas from/to which data is read or written. The minimum unit is one word. 17-bit to 32-bit data is handled as two words (32-bit data).




Figure 5.5 Example of a buffer memory area (D/A converter module)

Figure 5.5 shows 16 bit data in a D/A converter module as an example. A digital value has been written from the RCPU. A digital value of -32000 to 32000 is set in 16-bit signed binary.

(3) The buffer memory is RAM.




Figure 5.6 A/D conversion characteristics (voltage input)

An A/D converter module converts external analog inputs to digital values, and allows the CPU module to perform operations. At the voltage input, the A/D converter module outputs a digital value of -32000 at -10V and a digital value of 32000 at 10V. Thus, an input voltage of 312.5μ V corresponds to a digital value of 1. An input voltage lower than 312.5μ V cannot be converted and is omitted.

A/D conversion characteristics at the current input




Figure 5.7 A/D conversion characteristics (current input)

The A/D converter module outputs a digital value of 0 at 0mA and a digital value of 32000 at 20mA. An input current of 625nA corresponds to a digital value of 1. An input current lower than 625nA cannot be converted and is omitted.

5.6.5 Exercise with the demonstration machine



The analog value input to the channel 1 (CH1) of the R60AD4 is stored in a buffer memory area (digital value). Then, the value is read to the RCPU (data register D110) with the auto refresh setting.
- **2.** The initial indication device (D1) displays the digital conversion value.




Figure 5.8 D/A conversion characteristics (voltage output)

The D/ A converter module outputs an analog value of -10V when a digital value of -32000 is input and an analog value of 10V when a digital value of 32000 is input. Thus, a digital value of 1 corresponds to an analog value of 312.5μ V. If a digital value is a numerical figure after a decimal point, the value cannot be converted.




Figure 5.9 D/A conversion characteristics (current output)

6.1 Overview

In a multiple CPU system, more than one CPU module is mounted on the main base unit and each CPU module controls I/O modules and intelligent function modules separately.



6.2 Features

Multiple controllers

(1) Configuration suitable for the system to be used

Users can build one system using not only one RCPU but also multiple CPUs of RCPUs, Motion CPUs, and C Controller modules according to the system to be used. Creating a multiple CPU system improves the efficiency and maintainability of the system.

(2) Controlling of modules

Each CPU module of the multiple CPU system controls I/O modules and intelligent function modules mounted on a base unit by slot.

The I/O modules and intelligent function modules controlled by each CPU module of the multiple CPU system are set with GX Works3.


Building a sequence control system and motion control system on a single base unit

With the multiple CPU system of the RCPU and Motion CPU, the motion system that is the combination of sequence control and motion control on one base unit can be established.

Distribution of loads


(1) Distribution of processing

The overall system scan time can be reduced by distributing the high-load processing performed in a single RCPU over multiple CPU modules.



(2) Distribution of memory

The memory capacity used for the entire system can be increased by distributing the memory areas over multiple CPU modules.



Distribution of functions

Programs can be developed easily by distributing the functions, for example, having different CPU modules control production line A and production line B.


6.3 Differences with a Single CPU System

This section describes differences between a single CPU system and a multiple CPU system.

6.3.1 Mounting positions of modules

In a multiple CPU system, more than one CPU module (up to four CPU modules) is mounted on the main base unit and each CPU module controls I/O modules and intelligent function modules separately.

Loads can be distributed by processing and highly-loaded processing can be executed with multiple CPU modules.




These modules are controlled with the sequence programs of the RCPU2.

In a multiple CPU system, each module is defined as follows.

Control CPU Controlled module Non-controlled module CPU No.

- : RCPU that controls I/O modules and intelligent function modules
- : I/O modules and intelligent function modules controlled by control CPUs
- : Modules controlled by another CPU module

: Number assigned to each CPU module. The CPU module mounted on the CPU slot is CPU No.1, and CPU No.2, CPU No.3, and CPU No.4 are assigned to CPU modules mounted on the slots on the left of the CPU slot.



Point P

Up to four CPU modules can be mounted in the CPU slot (the slot on the right of the power supply module) to the slot No.2 of the main base unit.


6.3.2 I/O number assignment

In a multiple CPU system, the position (slot) of the I/O number 0H differs from that in the single CPU system. However, I/O numbers of extension base units, I/O numbers of each slot, and I/O numbers of empty slots are all assigned in the same way as the ones of a single CPU system.

Position of the I/O number "0H"


- In a multiple CPU system, CPU modules occupy for the number of slots set in the multiple CPU settings of the system parameter.
- I/O modules and intelligent function modules are mounted to the right of CPU modules.
- The I/O number "0H" is assigned to the I/O module or intelligent function module mounted to the right of the CPU module. The subsequent I/O numbers are assigned sequentially to the right.


2) RCPU: When four CPU modules are mounted

6.3.3 Data communications among CPU modules and controlled modules

Access to controlled modules

The range of accesses to controlled modules of the CPU modules is the same as that of a single CPU system. I/O refresh for the controlled modules and reading/writing of data from/to the buffer memory areas of intelligent function modules can be performed.

Access to non-controlled modules

Access from the CPU modules to non-controlled modules is limited to reading of data from the input device (DX) and buffer memory of the intelligent function modules. On/off data of input (X) and output (Y) devices of non-controlled modules can be loaded with the out-of-group I/O fetch function.

6.4 Data Communications Among CPU Modules in a Multiple CPU System

CPU modules in a multiple CPU system transfer data each other. Refresh communications and direct access communications allow the CPU modules to write and read data each other. The following table describes data communication methods.



6.4.2 Communication through refresh

The device data for each CPU module is written/read only by the parameter settings. Using refresh areas enables data communications among all or some of the CPU modules in a multiple CPU system, and each CPU module can use devices of other CPU modules.

Types of refresh operations






(1) Refresh using the CPU buffer memory




(2) Refresh using the fixed scan communication areas

Device data of the host CPU module is written to the refresh area in the fixed scan communication area of the CPU module at the cycle specified in the fixed scan communication cycle setting. The data written to the refresh area is sent to the refresh area in the fixed scan communication area of another CPU module, and this CPU module reads the transferred data into device areas.

When CPU No.1 refreshes 32 points (B0 to B1F) and CPU No.2 refreshes 32 points (B20 to B3F):



Executing refresh operations

Refresh operations are executed when the CPU module is in the RUN or STOP (PAUSE) state.

Data that can be set

The following describes data that can be refreshed.

- (1) Maximum number of settingsUp to 32 settings can be set in each CPU module with each refresh.

The number of data points can be set within the number of points assigned to the fixed scan communication area (within send range of the area) in increments of two points. Duplications of devices among multiple setting numbers are not allowed.

(3) Data that can be specified

Devices other than local devices can be specified. However, when "Use File Register of Each Program" is enabled, file registers cannot be specified. Otherwise, refresh operations are not performed with file registers of each program depending on the operating status of a CPU module.





With a read instruction, other CPU modules read data that the host CPU module have written to areas in its CPU buffer memory with a write instruction. Unlike refresh operations, data that has been stored at execution of an instruction can be directly read.







6.5.2 System configuration of the demonstration machine

This section describes the operation overview of the multiple CPU system through a simple example. The system has two CPU modules (CPU No.1 and No.2), and each CPU module controls a different intelligent function module (A/D converter module or D/A converter module) and transfers data in each intelligent function module between the CPU modules.



6.5.3 Creating a program for the CPU No.1

Create the following program for checking the operations of the multiple CPU system.

Generally, in the multiple CPU system with auto refresh settings, when multiple data communications are performed among CPU modules, old data may be mixed with new data.


Interlocks are required as a measure against this problem.

For this demonstration, no interlock is required since communication data is 1 word. Thus, create a simple program as shown below.

Sequence program for the CPU No.1

This sequence program performs the sampling processing on an analog voltage input from CH1 of the R60AD4, and converts it into a digital value.

The converted digital value is stored in the device for auto refresh (D110).

In addition, the CC-Link IE Field Network or SSCNET III/H synchronous communication synchronizes the operation timing of nodes on the network. This feature reduces variations caused by the network transmission delay time, allowing users to establish a stable system.








Appendix 1 System Configuration of the Demonstration Machine

When an error code is displayed in the middle of settings, error details and actions can be checked by clicking the [Detail Display] button on the right of the error code display area. Error codes can be cleared by clicking the [Error Clear] button.



Precautions for using timers

The RCPU updates the current values of timers and turns on or off contacts of them at execution of the OUT $T\Box$ instruction. Thus, if the current value of a timer becomes equal to or larger than the set value when the coil of the timer turns on, the contact of the timer will turn on.

To create a program in which the operation of a timer contact triggers the operation of another timer, program the timers in order from the one that operates last.

In the following cases, if a program is created in order of timer measurements, all timers turn on in the same scan.

- The value set to a high-speed timer is smaller than the scan time.
- The value set to a low-speed timer is 1.


The program in an inline ST box can be edited in the same way as that is written in ST.

Operating procedure



■Precautions for creating ladders

- Only one inline ST box can be created in one ladder block.
- An FB instance and inline ST box cannot be arranged in one ladder block.
- Creating an inline ST box at the position of an instruction corresponding to a contact creates an inline ST box at the position of an instruction corresponding to a coil.
- When an unconverted inline ST exists on the ladder editor, the program cannot be edited. Convert the program and edit it.

■Precautions on the inside of an inline ST box

- Up to 2048 characters can be entered in an inline ST box. (A line break is counted as one character.)
- Up to 23 local labels can be used in an inline ST box (except for constants).
- · Labels of the following data types cannot be used.
 - Counter
 - Timer
 - Retentive timer
 - Pointer
 - Structure
 - Array
 - Function block
- · Lower-case device names cannot be used as labels regardless of option settings.
- · Instructions cannot be entered using the "Element Selection" window.
- The template function of ST programs cannot be used.
- · Label suggestions are not displayed.
- The editing status cannot be restored to the previous one by performing operations such as selecting [Edit] → [Undo].

■Verifying a program containing an inline ST

When a project or project revision is verified by selecting "Program", an inline ST is not the verification target. To verify a program containing an inline ST, select "Program File".

Finding or replacing items in a program containing an inline ST

The inside of an inline ST box is not the target of the following find/replace functions.

- [Replace String]
- [Find Device/Label]/[Replace Device/Label]
- [Find Instruction]/[Replace Instruction]
- [Find Contact or Coil]
- [Change Open/Close Contact]
- [Device Batch Replace]

When searching the inside of an inline ST box, use [Cross Reference] or [Device List].

■Copying an inline ST box

When copying an inline ST box, select a ladder block including the left side of the left rail. Copying only contacts in a ladder block containing an inline ST box or only an inline ST box is not allowed.

Copying a ladder block containing an unconverted inline ST box is also not allowed. Convert the program and then copy the ladder block.

■Jumping to an inline ST box during monitoring

When jumping to an inline ST box is performed by a search or verification operation during monitoring, the cursor will be moved to the target position but the range will not be selected.

Appendix 7 Battery

Install a battery in the CPU module to hold data in the program memory, RAM, and latch devices at power-off.

The following table lists the performance specifications of the battery used for the CPU module.

Appendix 8 Real Number (Floating-point Data)

Data size and data range

Real number data includes single-precision 32-bit real number data and double-precision 64-bit real number data.

Real number data can be stored only in devices other than bit devices or in single-precision or double-precision real data type labels.

Configuration of single-precision real number data

Single-precision real number data consists of a sign, mantissa, and exponent, and is expressed as shown below.



The following figure shows the bit configuration of the internal expression of single-precision real number data and the meaning of each part.



Sign Exponent

Mantissa

■Sign (1 bit)

This bit represents the positive or negative sign of a numerical value. "0" indicates a positive number or 0. "1" Indicates a negative number.

■Mantissa (23 bits)

A mantissa means XXXXX... of 1.XXXXX... $\times 2^{N}$ representing a single-precision real number in binary.

■Exponent (8 bits)

An exponent means N of $1.XXXXX... \times 2^{N}$ representing a single-precision real number in binary. The following table shows the relationships between the exponent value and N of a single-precision real number.



Configuration of double-precision real number data

Double-precision real number data consists of a sign, mantissa, and exponent, and is expressed as shown below.



The following figure shows the bit configuration of the internal expression of double-precision real number data and the meaning of each part.



■Sign (1 bit)

This bit represents the positive or negative sign of a numerical value. "0" indicates a positive number or 0. "1" Indicates a negative number.

■Mantissa (52 bits)

A mantissa means XXXXX... of 1.XXXXX... $\times 2^{N}$ representing a single-precision real number in binary.

■Exponent (11 bits)

An exponent means N of $1.XXXXX... \times 2^{N}$ representing a single-precision real number in binary. The following table shows the relationships between the exponent value and N of a single-precision real number.

Precautions

When setting an input value of single-precision real number from the engineering tool

The number of significant digits is about 7 because the engineering tool processes single precision real number data in 32-bit single precision.

When the input value of single-precision real number data exceeds 7 digits, the 8th digit is rounded off.

Therefore, if the rounded-off value goes out of the range from -2147483648 to 2147483647, it will not be an intended value.



When "2147483647" is set as an input value, it is handled as "2147484000" because the 8th digit "6" is rounded off.



When "E1.1754943562" is set as an input value, it is handled as "E1.175494" because the 8th digit "3" is rounded off.

When setting an input value of double-precision real number from the engineering tool

The number of significant digits is about 15 because the engineering tool processes double precision real number data in 64bit double precision.

When the input value of double-precision real number data exceeds 15 digits, the 16th digit is rounded off.

Therefore, if the rounded-off value goes out of the range from -2147483648 to 2147483647, it will not be an intended value.



When "2147483646.12345678" is set as an input value, it is handled as "2147483646.12346" because the 16th digit "6" is rounded off.



When "E1.7976931348623157+307" is set as an input value, it is handled as "E1.79769313486232+307" because the 16th digit "5" is rounded off.



The monitor function of the engineering tool can monitor real number data of CPU modules.

To represent "0" in real number data, set all numbers in each of the following range to 0.

- Single-precision real number data: b0 to b31
- Double-precision real number data: b0 to b63

The setting range of real number data is as follows.*1

- Single-precision real number data: -2¹²⁸ < [single-precision real number data] ≤ -2⁻¹²⁶, 0, 2⁻¹²⁶ ≤ [single-precision real number data] < 2¹²⁸
- Double-precision real number data: -2^{1024} < [double-precision real number data] \leq -2^{-1022} , 0, $2^{-1022} \leq$ [double-precision real number data] < 2^{1024}


Do not specify "-0" (only the most significant bit is 1) in real number data. Performing a real number operation using -0 results in an operation error.


Appendix 9 Changing Input Response Time

For an input module, high-speed input module, or I/O combined module, the input response time can be changed in the module parameters of GX Works3.


